- 23 CEO's from largest business & industry in the State
- Iowa Competitive Dashboard; Post Secondary Attainment not good in Iowa thus Future Ready Iowa 70% attainment goal

Student Mental Health Conversation

- AEA is doing some Operational Sharing to bring mental health supports, especially in rural areas.
- AEA is providing Youth Mental Health First Aid training, but the full training is 8 hours. They are looking at providing condensed training and have it differentiated between elementary and secondary needs.
- This is a work-in-progress as the AEA provides more resources.
- Many districts are using Operational Sharing dollars for Social Workers, but more clarity from the State would be helpful to understand all the requirements.
- Marshalltown gained support from teachers to use TQ PD \$ to provide SEL training in-house.
- Marshalltown has partnership with Four Oaks for therapeutic based services, instruction, etc.
- Marshalltown has social workers at all schools half/full time and contracts with local private mental health counseling providers.
- Marshalltown training teachers in "Think Kids" curriculum out of Boston
 Dr. Ablon Central Rivers AEA also helping to facilitate this training locally.
- Winterset Zones of Regulation Training being used with common expectations throughout the district. Winterset also partners with Four Oaks to provide services - 3 trauma informed classes (16 seats).
 Neighboring districts come to Winterset for services. AASA cohort on SEL, Help for Billy-Heather Forbes, Self-care, Wellness Coordinator





- reinstituted for each building, scheduled time for SEL curriculum, focused on relationships with students and parents.
- Added 2 counselors, social worker, behavior strategist. Up next: collaboration for specialized classrooms with trauma needs and conduct needs. https://www.edutopia.org/article/evolution-trauma-informed-school
- Every District is being creative and using selective funds (TLC, At-Risk, Operational Sharing, grant dollars, etc.) wisely, but it comes down to needing more SSA dollars to adequately provide the resources needed to address student mental health issues.
- Greene County will be conducting a Youth Mental Health Fair this school year.

12:15 – 12:45 ISASP/ESSA/Accountability Updates

- Test results will be available sometime after Oct. 22
- Jan./Feb. will be the accountability release
- Hope for 2020 testing will be quicker turnaround (late Spring?); writing scoring can pose problems with turnaround however.
- Agreed upon cut scores should stay for some time
- Science Test; New Science Standards (NGSS) significantly more rigorous than prior standards
- Year 2 of ESSA Designation; 2 required components District Site visit & June Institute Attendance for Districts with 2 or more school designations. All other steps are highly recommended. Schools identified will be so for three years. New cohort of targeted and/or comprehensive schools will be determined with this year's designations.

12:45 – 1:00 Chapter 103 (seclusion and restraint) updates and Feedback

- Last time the rules were changed was 2007-08.
- 2 years ago, a group of petitioners petitioned to revise the rules.
- A group was convened representing many stakeholder groups to discuss possible changes.
- 18 months of work to iron out 90% of what was being proposed





- Strategy of Last Resort
- Definitions, clarifications on when appropriate to use, training & reporting requirements. Guidelines on seclusion rooms.
- The new rules went through a process of input with public hearings, but they were voted down unanimously by the State Board of Education in August.
- 3 main issues were problematic:
 - The wording "To prevent or terminate an imminent threat of serious physical injury"
 - The physical requirement for size of seclusion and restraint rooms (7 feet and no less than 70 square feet).
 - o Timing of parental notification requirements
 - Next steps 6 regional meetings to revise rules and bring back to November 20th
 - o State Board Meeting for notice.
 - o Tabletop discussion to solicit input and discuss alternatives.

1:00 – 1:30 Regional Centers and Perkins Reauthorization

- Federal law reauthorized and now State plan needs to be developed. The process will kick off in October. State plan is due mid-April. A first draft will be developed by December.
- Career Academy Incentive Fund built into SAVE; competitive grants to support the creation of career academies. CTE programs capital intensive. Consistent & equitable access is the goal.
- First year 1 million in grant money. The goal is to get to 5 million each year. K-12 and Community Colleges can apply, but there has to be a partnership with K-12 if a CC is involved.
